TRANSPLANTING IRISES IN THE PRESCOTT AREA

In our area (elevation 5000'-6500' and garden zone of 7) irises thrive best when transplanted from the middle of July through the first week of September. Are these absolute rules? July and August are. It takes about 6 weeks for newly planted irises to develop a viable root system. The new root system begins to supply water and nutrients to the plant, increasing winter survival rates. This is critical.

If you transplant irises in early October, the Prescott area can have a mid-October freeze which stops or slows down root development. It's *all* about probability. Transplant in July and August and the probability for plant survival and bloom for the following year increases substantially. Transplant in mid-September or later and the chances for good growth and bloom the following year diminishes.

Additionally, when irises are transplanted, it is imperative to water them deeply and well. I use a hand held garden hose and as I water, I dig into the soil with my trowel so the water gets below the surface to the roots. Always add 5 gallons of compost to the hole plus 1 cup of bone meal and/or triple phosphate when planting several iris in one hole. I also add 1 cup of 10-10-10 garden fertilizer to the soil in the hole. Mix it well, water well, then plant the irises.

Both of these varieties were planted next to a rose bush, and received the benefit of the rose fertilizer this spring.



Rhizome Sale Report

The Rhizome Sale at Sharlot Hall Museum was another smashing success. We had over 125 different named iris for sale which you contributed. We applaud your generosity. We also sold rhizomes 5 Saturdays at the Prescott Farmer's Market. Our overall total rhizome sales topped \$3000.00. Thank you for your purchases and for your time volunteering to make this event a successful club fund raiser.

The iris, Matt McNames, which won Best of Show at our spring exhibit was the rhizome sale raffle prize. The raffle winner was Tom Fields from Rimrock. Congratulations, Tom!! Thanks, Linda Rossman, for donating this iris.



Planting Your Auction Irises

The rhizomes we received for the auction have been potted by board members so that by the time you purchase the rhizomes, they should have begun to develop roots. They were potted in a mixture of half soil amendment and half top soil to which we added some granular fertilizer. The pots will be kept moist, but not sopping wet, to encourage root growth. After purchasing the iris, you now have a decision to make. Do you want to leave them in the pot through the winter or transplant them immediately. We have tried both methods. If you choose to leave the iris in the one gallon pots, you may want to huddle the pots close together and put dirt or mulch around them to give the rhizomes a little protection from the winter cold. You would not start the protection until early November. You might want to move the iris into 2 gallon pots. The iris growing in two gallon pots survived last winter quite adequately and some even bloomed the first year.
