President's Report To the Board of Region 15 for Prescott Area Iris Society

2013 presents itself to be an exciting and busy year for PAIS. Our club is very active in fund raising activities which not only support the society but also support our current and developing community outreach programs in the Prescott Tri City Area. Our evolving outreach programs for 2013 will consist of support for the Sharlot Hall Museum, a historical museum complex featuring the architectural, cultural and horticultural aspects of the Prescott area from the mid 1860's to the early decades of the 20th century. PAIS also supports the work of the Friends of Yavapai College Art Sculpture Garden including the Dykes Medal Iris Garden and other iris plantings throughout the Sculpture Garden. This year PAIS is evolving its community outreach to potentially include environmental/horticultural projects at Yavapai College, possible expansion of the Phase IV Sculpture Garden Project at Yavapai College along with outreach in the public school system interfacing with the Highlands Nature Center in Prescott.

We are looking forward to our representatives attending the Region 15 Spring Trek in San Diego, Ca. in April. In May we will be holding our annual spring iris exhibit and sale entitled "**Kaleidoscope of Color**" 2013 which now has name recognition throughout Arizona. Last year's attendance at this event was between 250 to 300 people. It was a magnificent display of hundreds of iris. Visitors attended from all over the state. PAIS is also privileged this year to have an article in AAA' High Roads Magazine featuring the Yavapai College Sculpture Garden, The Dykes Medal Iris Garden and PAIS in the May/June Edition.

Our major annual rhizome sale will take place July 27th and 28th at the Sharlot Hall Museum. Sales will continue on August 2nd in Chino Valley and Yarnell on August 3rd. We will also be conducting several Farmers Market Sales this year. We are looking at beginning major renovation to our plantings at the Yavapai College Sculpture Garden by renovating existing planting beds and expanding our plantings in other areas of the garden. We are looking forward to expanding participation by our society members in these projects.

We are anticipating six board meetings this year to conduct our business. We will have four general membership meetings two of which will be pot luck events, one ice cream social with the annual auction and one with a photo contest. Our general membership meetings will have speakers discussing various aspects of iris culture, speakers from the local Master Gardeners program and other horticultural topics besides the normal PAIS business and social activities.

Our new board consists of a good mix of experienced board members and four members never before on the board some of which are new members this year. Our general membership now stands at 41 with another 34 free trial memberships for those who had joined late last year. We however, only anticipate 10% of the new members from trial memberships to be returning by our first general meeting in February.

Honorary Membership Bestowed



Last year a proposal was put before the Board to recognize the achievements of Stan and Judy Book as Honorary Members of PAIS as two of the founding members of the society. Stan and Judy are two dedicated, wonderful, talented and generous people. They have done a great deal for PAIS over the years both publicly and behind the scenes. The Board voted unanimously in December to award this Honorary Membership to Stan and Judy. A certificate was presented to them at our first Board meeting of the year on January 5, 2013.

Iris Care—Winter

If your garden looks like mine, it is a pretty sorry sight at this time of year. The grass has started to grow, there are many dead leaves in each clump, some of the rhizomes are either buried or have started to heave up out of the ground and markers are laying on the ground instead of standing upright. So now while the weather is warmish, It is time to rectify all these problems.

As damp as it has been, there is no need to water. By the beginning of March it is time to fertilize the iris with a low nitrogen fertilizer. Fertilizer with the numbers 10-10-10 is recommended. Hopefully, after you planted your iris, you made a map showing where each iris is located, so it will be easy for you to place the fallen plant markers beside the correct plant.

The listing will show what value each nursery places on the voucher and the minimum order each nursery requires. The list will also appear on the AIS website, www.irises.org

When you mail your order to one of the participating nurseries, include your voucher with the order. If you order online you must mail your original voucher to the nursery. Your voucher can be used only once and with the nursery of your choice. The voucher must be redeemed by December 31, 2013.

The voucher value does not count toward a minimum purchase amount. Most vendors do not treat this as a discount off the order, but rather will provide you with a plant of their choice at the value listed for the voucher. You will pay the shipping charge on your order as usual.
