PAIS's annual "Kaleidoscope of Color" Iris Exhibit is happening on Saturday, April 29 from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM at Stoneridge Community Center. We are hopeful the show coincides with peak iris bloom this year, and that our members and local iris gardeners can show their beautiful blooms for all to enjoy.

The format of the exhibit will continue to be the popular "Peoples' Choice Exhibit" with no AIS judging. Bring your favorite irises and arrangements. Potted iris plants in a multitude of colors will be available for purchase at the exhibit. CAROLYN ALEXANDER 1942-2023


Carolyn's love of iris materialized after she moved to their 3 acre home site in Prescott. Iris were one of the few flowers that critters seemed to leave alone. After discovering that iris grew exceptionally well for her, Carolyn planted 18 garden beds with 650 varieties of iris which soon became more than 3000 plants. After fencing her garden she added bulbs and grew many flower varieties. Her love of flowers and animals soon became a focus in her paintings.

Carolyn was PAIS president 2010-2011. Her many club contributions were hosting garden tours of her iris, chairing rhizome auctions, helping maintain the iris gardens at

Yavapai College, presiding over spring iris shows, presenting informative exhibit presentations and displaying her many beautiful iris at club meetings and exhibits.

My fondest memories of Carolyn are the times she opened her garden to the club for a tour and luncheon. She took such pride in her iris garden and she created lovely themed arrangements of iris in each bed. Carolyn loved shar-

ing her iris and if a member requested that she "gift" an iris of particular beauty, she usually granted their request. Her many talents will be missed by our club members. *Editor*

COLOR PATTERNS

Illustrations of some of the color patterns introduced at February's meeting.

Color Wash - an enhancement, no defined border on the color. *Celtic Tartan-Keppel*





Waterfall Marking—color cascades down the fall. *Inkblot-Keppel*

Thumbprint — solid smudge of different color on either side of beard in the area of the haft.

Persian Berry-Gaulter





Chevron Marking – upside down chevron on the fall around the beard. *Expanding Universe-Black*

Maculosa Pattern – speckles on the petals, different from broken color—*Don't Doubt Dalton-Burseen*





Zonal Spots or spray pattern - white or lightened area around the beard, some of the spots looks like white spray pattern. *Gypsy Lord-Keppel*

Bands - different colors around standards or falls on the edge. *Wonders Never Cease-Black*





Veining – lines that are a contrasting color or darker color on the standards than the ground color of the petal.

Spring Iris Care

- 1. Remove dead leaves
- 2. Pull weeds while they are small. Take care not to break off the new, young fans.
- 3. Uncover dirt from tops of rhizomes
- 4. Replace fallen and faded plant markers and make sure your iris map is up to date
- 5. Second fertilizer application due mid March. Water in the fertilizer. Use a low nitrogen fertilizer like 5-10-10 or 6-24-24. Avoid putting fertilizer granules in direct contact with the rhizomes.
- 6. Water the iris regularly every 7-10 days if it has been dry, to insure good bloom. Iris need to dry out completely between each watering.



What makes an iris historic?

An iris that has been registered and introduced 30 years ago is considered to be "historic".

The Historic Iris Preservation Society has assembled a gallery of the class of "1993", iris which are now considered historic. Several of these have been grown by our members in the past. Visit the Gallery and select '1993' under Ages. https://historiciris.org/.
